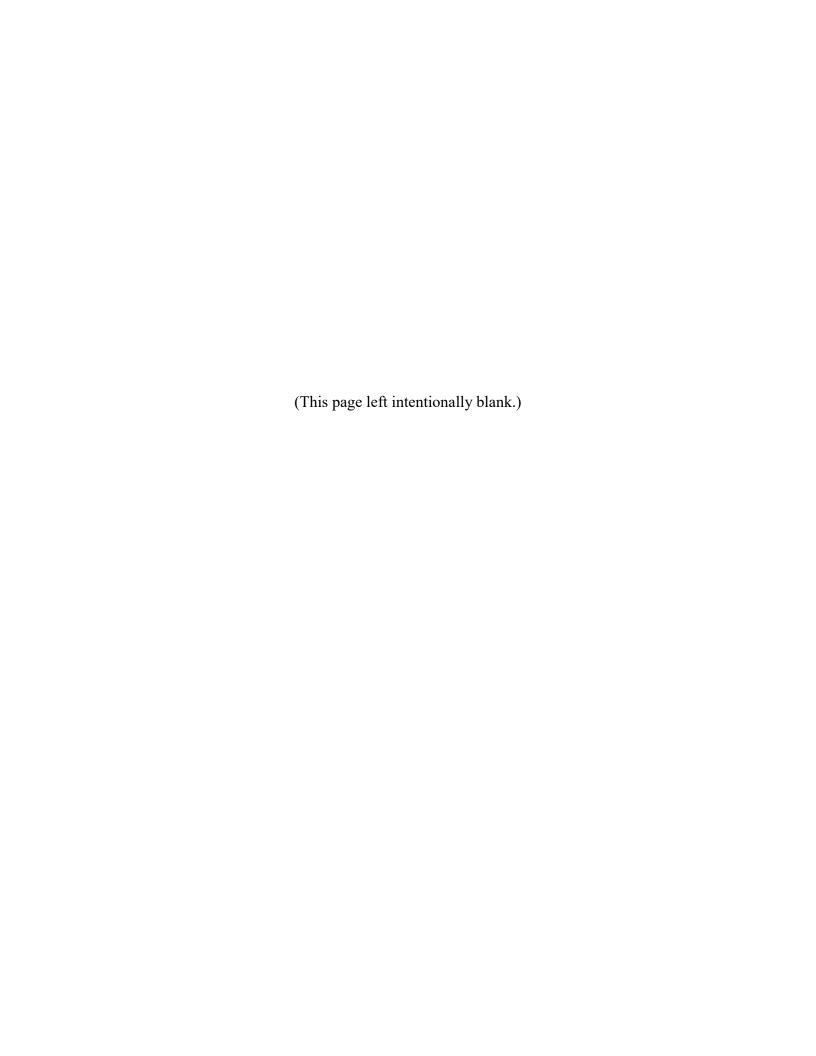

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CITY OF KODIAK RESOLUTION NUMBER 2017–13

A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KODIAK RESCINDING RESOLUTION NO. 2015–16 AND ESTABLISHING FUNDING CRITERIA FOR NONPROFIT GRANTS

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes and supports local nonprofit organizations and has historically made funding available to these organizations on an annual basis; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the appropriate total amount of City funds to grant to nonprofit organizations is a maximum of one percent of budgeted general fund revenues, exclusive of any fund balance appropriation; and

WHEREAS, City funds have been provided to nonprofit organizations that supplement and compliment the services provided to residents by the City; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City Council to update this policy statement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the City of Kodiak, Alaska hereby establishes the following additional funding criteria for nonprofit grants provided by the City:

- 1. Organizations receiving funds must be legally recognized by the Internal Revenue Service.
- 2. Organizations are limited to one funding criteria or program per year.
- 3. Funding will be granted only for the following kinds of programs/activities and up to the maximum identified funding amount per organization and program type as defined:
 - a. Youth Recreation Programs

\$5,000

Indoor and outdoor recreational activities typically include games and pursuit of hobbies and activities that one engages in, for entertainment. Typically included in this category are activities like baseball, football, hockey, swimming, basketball, wrestling, cheerleading singing, reading, listening to music, watching movies, dancing, and aerobics.

b. Adult Recreation Programs

\$5,000

Indoor and outdoor recreational activities typically include games and pursuit of hobbies and activities that one engages in, for entertainment. Typically included in this category are activities like baseball, football, hockey, swimming, basketball, wrestling, cheerleading singing, reading, listening to music, watching movies, dancing, and aerobics.

c. Public Safety Support Programs

\$15,000

Programs serving the entire Kodiak area through its emergency shelters and food service programs. Typically included in this category are food banks, soup kitchens, sleeping shelters, crisis centers, senior services and animal shelters.

d. Emergency Response Support Programs

\$15,000

Programs that provide humanitarian relief, disaster relief and education designed to mitigate local disasters. Typically included in this category are emergency temporary shelters, counseling, public awareness and basic humanitarian needs.

4. Subject to available funding, the Council may authorize a special one-time funding increase for a special project.

Since 2009, the Alutiiq Museum has hosted an annual fall lecture series. We developed this free community event in response to a survey of residents. People asked the museum to provide access to archaeologists, artists, culture bearers, historians, linguists, and scientists that study Kodiak. They expressed interest in connecting to research and researchers to learn more about Kodiak's cultural and natural environments and ask questions of the experts. The program has helped residents learn about their home and given researchers a place to share their study results in a non-technical way. Every researcher provides an illustrated PowerPoint presentation tailored to a general audience, then visits with community members following the talk. Lecture topics have included a wide range of subjects; flotsam, Kodiak's orchids, the Alutiiq alphabet, skate fisheries, petroglyphs, the Thelma C seiner, earthquakes, the Karluk Fisheries Reserve, Alutiiq masks, brown bears, and much more.

The program has been popular. In 2014, about 300 people attend the series, held at the museum on Thursday evenings. Many also asked if the lectures could be made accessible on the Internet, so they could watch at home, share presentations with others, or listen to a talk a second time. Kodiak is strengthened when people are discussing local cultures, environmental issues, and the history of their home. A robust dialog about the islands provides place-based education. It helps people understand the many issues and perspectives that shape Kodiak today. Moreover, the museum's mission of preserving and sharing Alutiiq culture is advanced by providing all people with access to heritage research.

Over the years, we noted that many of the same people returned to the lecture series each year. While this was a great outcome, and suggested patrons valued the program, we saw an opportunity to expand our audience. In 2016, the museum tested ways to strengthen attendance. We hypothesized that by hosting some of the lectures offsite, in another community location, we might attract new participants and expand the program audience. As such, we partnered with the Kodiak Public Library to hold half of the lectures in their multi-purpose room. We also added refreshments to the program—to encourage discussion after the talks, videotaped the lectures for sharing online, and distributed audience surveys at each lecture to solicit feedback for improvements. The results were very positive. At lectures held off-site we saw new faces, people who had previously attended library programs but not

We regularly collaborate with Kodiak non-profits in order to maximize the potential for positive impact. Our monthly First Friday Art Walks are a collaboration between business venues and the Alutiiq and Baranov Museums. We are currently supporting the Healthy Tomorrows/Kodiak Strong Downtown Farmer's Market by providing free arts activities to attendees. We frequently provide complimentary tickets to our Performing Arts Series events to local service providers including Hope Community Resources, Kodiak Island Housing Authority, and Sun'aq Tribe programs. We partner annually with the Kodiak Public Library Association for the Altered Books Art show in February. Our Member Organization program is built on the idea of collaboration and sharing resources. Our Performing Arts Series annually brings to the City professional touring artists and arts groups. In addition to performances, these visiting artists often provide workshops and master classes in their art forms. Funding received from the City of Kodiak will support our Community Theatre program. Our Performing Arts Series in FY18 will include two works of community theatre: 1) the stage play *It Happens Every Summer* in the fall, and 2) the musical theatre *Disney's Mary Poppins* in the spring.

We believe that everyone has artistic capacity, and that encouraging people to lead creative, expressive lives will enhance the quality of life in Kodiak. Through these two community theatre productions we will engage approximately 200 people in a shared artistic process. Community theatre relies on trust, teamwork, and creative problem-solving, all critical qualities to successful interpersonal relationships. We know from decades of this work that community theatre brings people of diverse backgrounds together to explore and share ideas about history, culture, relationships, and the human experience. We also anticipate that 2,740 people will experience these works of theatre as audience members.

It Happens Every Summer, directed by Jared Griffin, performances November 3, 4, and 5, 2017 It Happens Every Summer by Broadway playwright David Rogers is a comedy stage play, with character speaking roles for 20 actors (13 women/7 men, with some flexibility), and an additional 10 to 15 ensemble roles. Set in the early 1960s, the play explores themes of personal ambition and love, and the conflict between the two. The story begins as the editor-in-chief of "Debutante" magazine and her staff welcome the prize winners of the guest editor contest from colleges all over the country to their Manhattan offices. In the month ahead, the young women learn more about their chosen profession, and themselves, as they strive to be retained as regular staff writers. The gestalt of the production is Mad Men meets The Devil Wears Prada. It offers unique and interesting characters for actors, including many strong roles for women of all ages. The production also offers distinct challenges in costuming and set design to create the world of 1960s Manhattan in the Gerald C. Wilson Auditorium. To meet this challenge, we will work with Brian Saylor, Scenic Designer with Anchorage Community Theatre, to offer a workshop on scenic design principals, and set painting techniques. The goals of the workshop are to expand our trained volunteer corps in an important visual arts aspect of theatre production, and to complete a portion of the set for the production.

Disney's Mary Poppins, directed by Lissa Jensen, performances March 3, 4, 9, and 10, 2018 Based on the books by P.L. Travers, Disney's Mary Poppins is an audience favorites and has received nominations for nine Olivier and seven Tony Awards, including Best Musical. The jack-of-all trades, Bert, introduces us to England in 1910 and the troubled Banks family. Young Jane and Michael have sent many a nanny packing before Mary Poppins arrives on their doorstep. Using a combination of magic and common sense, she must teach the family members how to value each other again.

Mary Poppins will engage approximately 50 actors, singers, and dancers on-stage and more than 60 volunteers behind the scenes (set design and construction, props, costuming, hair & makeup, lighting and sound, stage hands, front-of-house volunteers), over 3 months of rehearsing. We anticipate that Mary Poppins will attract an audience of 1,650 people over four performances. To achieve the special effects required in the show we will bring ZFX Flying, Inc. to the island to work with actors and stagehands to successfully "fly" lead characters across the stage.

Our request for support from the City of Kodiak represents approximately 8.6% of the entire program budget to produce both plays. We anticipate that approximately 75% of production costs will be recouped through ticket sales. The remainder we will raise through business and individual donations.

City funding is a very important component to our annual operating budget. We leverage the City's investment in our work to attract foundation support and business donors.

The changing landscape of state and municipal funding has significantly impacted the Kodiak Arts Council in the past two years. In FY16 we received \$14,000 in grant funding from the State, and \$22,500 in combined support from Kodiak's two municipalities. In FY18 we will receive zero funding from the Kodiak Island Borough, and are eligible to apply for up to \$5,000 in support from the City of Kodiak. Our application for state funding has been positively reviewed but the available funds are still uncertain and undetermined, and we anticipate receiving less than \$10,000 in state support. We have already adjusted programing to this new reality by reducing the number of professional touring artists we bring to the island annually from five (5) to three (3), and by raising ticket prices for performing arts series events. We have been able to continue our arts education efforts (Sum'Arts for Kids and arts instruction opportunities throughout the year) with support from a private foundation grant.

Describe accomplishments with grant funds.

Funding from the City of Kodiak in FY17 supported our major annual programs, including our Performing Arts Series, Community Theater program and Sum'Arts for Kids. Ticket sales and attendance records indicate that more than 4,890 people experienced and participated in the Arts over the past year through these three programs. Through our Performing Arts Series, Kodiak residents experienced a wide range of high-quality professional acts from around the world. This past year we have hosted five professional touring performances, and four of our visiting arts groups conducted free outreach activities: a special student concert on world music and a cappella harmonizing for every student grades 3 - 5 on the Kodiak road system with Women of the World (October 2016), a meet and greet and intimate performance with Inuit throat singer Tanya Tagaq at the Alutiiq Museum (November 2016), a hip hop dance performance for Kodiak Middle School student body plus an after-school dance workshop for middle and high school students with Versa Style Dance Company (January 2017), and a fiddle improvisation workshop with advanced orchestra students with Rhythm Future Quartet (March 2017).

We also produced the classic holiday ballet *The Nutcracker* in December of 2016 in partnership with the Little School of Dance. *The Nutcracker* involved more than 200 performers and more than 40 volunteers behind the scenes, over 3 months of work. *The Nutcracker* alone attracted audiences of 1,620 people.

We work hard to keep ticket prices to our events affordable, and keep the arts accessible in Kodiak, through business sponsorship and grant funding for artist travel expenses. At any given performance 9% of the audience in attendance will have received a complimentary ticket, and an additional 23% will be attending on a discounted ticket (senior citizen or youth discount). For the Versa Style Dance Company performance, we distributed 78 ticket vouchers to students who participated in the after-school Hip Hop dance workshop. We saw 74 vouchers come back at the Box Office for the public performance the next day, a remarkable 95% return.

City funding through the Youth Recreation category has also supported the Sum'Arts for Kids program which provides summer camps and classes in visual arts, theatre, dance, fiber arts, music, and media arts to Kodiak kids. For FY17, this program enrolled more than 300 young people. Importantly, City funding helped us provide financial aid scholarships for twenty one families (26 students, including sibling groups), for whom the registration fee was a impediment to participation. We have been able to maintain this program in the face of diminishing state and municipal funding through through the aid of a private foundation grant that pays for the majority of the salary for our Arts Education Coordinator. Support from the City is a critical indicator that private foundations look for when considering whether to invest in our programs and work. We appreciate your continued support very much.

SERVICES:

Kodiak Teen Court, Inc., founded in 1995, is a community based restorative justice project developed and operated in a manner consistent with the goals and recommendations of the *Alaska Governor's Conference on Youth and Justice*. Current teen attorneys and judges include Fifty (50) youth in grades 8-12; each has completed a three (3) month "Introduction to Law/Teen Court" class taught by Program volunteers in the classroom and courtroom. Seventeen (16) of these students are also gaining valuable leadership experience by serving as Corporation officers, Directors and Bar Association officers. Kodiak Teen Court members must participate in a minimum of four (4) CLE (Continuing Legal Education) training segments during each FY to remain active in the program.

Defendants are referred to Kodiak Teen Court in two ways. The Juvenile Probation Officer, with the concurrence of the minor and their parent/guardian, may refer youth following a screening process for suitability. This occurs within the terms of the "Youth Court Act", AS 47.12.400. In

the second scenario, a minor may plead "guilty" or "no contest" in regular court to a charge of "Minor possessing or consuming alcohol or tobacco". With the concurrence of the judge or the magistrate, if the youth is 18 or younger they may elect deferral to Kodiak Teen Court for sentencing. In this case, Kodiak Teen Court serves as a "Community Diversion Panel" within the terms of AS 04.16.050(b) and AS 12.55.085.
