Community Mitigation Plan

To better adapt to the COVID-19 pandemic, the EOC is updating the Community Mitigation Plan to align with the Pandemic Influenza Plan, local emergency services plans and the World Health Organization.

Everyone should continue to practice these personal protective measures to help prevent the spread of COVID-19:

- Social distancing*
- Wear face coverings
- Wash hands frequently
- Minimize social interactions
- Stay home and isolate yourself if you are sick

Depending on the severity of community spread, the Emergency Services Director may implement any of the following mitigation measures:

- Phase 1: Low Risk of Human Cases
- Phase 2: Higher Risk of Human Cases
- Phase 3: No or very limited human to human transmission
- Phase 4: Evidence of increased human to human transmission
- Phase 5: Evidence of significant human to human transmission
- Phase 6: Efficient and sustained human to human transmission

As cases, hospitalizations, and deaths increase or decrease, mitigation measures will be adjusted. The below listed mitigation measures are not an all exclusive list, additional measures may be implemented as necessary.

	2	Personal protective measures	Higher Risk of Human Cases
Pandemic Alert Period. New Virus causes human cases.	3	No gatherings > 20 people w/o the ability to social distance; face coverings highly recommended	No or very limited human to human transmission
	4	Face Covering mandate	Evidence of significant human to human transmission
Pandemic Alert Period. New Virus causes human cases.	5	Limited Capacity to essential and non-essential businesses	Sustained human to human transmission
Pandemic Period	6	Essential services and critical infrastructure only (Attachment A); limited patron capacity; face coverings required**	Sustained human to human transmission

* Distance of at least six feet should be maintained between individuals and groups of non-household members; if singing or projecting of voice, then a minimum of ten feet between each person (Source: State of Alaska Reopen Alaska Responsibly Guidance, Attachment N, Social, Religious, and Other Gatherings ADVISORY DOCUMENT PHASE III-IV dated May 22, 2020).

** Exceptions for individuals that have medical or health conditions that could be further complicated by wearing a face covering.
